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### DEDICATION

This town report is dedicated to Henry Potter, naturalist and long time resident of Clarendon.

Born in Wallingford on August 4, 1891 to Louis Napoleon Potter and Alice Jessie Potter he came to Clarendon at age 7, was brought up on his great-grandfathers farm, which to date Henry still declares as his residence and has been in the Potter family for 175 years.

His parents interest in nature resulted in Henry's interest at an early age. Although his education was thru grade 9 in "Chippenhook" his knowledge of birds and plants in New England extends beyond that of most professionals in the field.

At 93 years of age Henry has been honored several times. The Vermont Institute of Natural Science called him "The Naturalist of the Century" in part for his studies and photographs of the peregrine falcon. On May 16, 1981 Mr. Potter was honored with a Dr. of Science Degree from U.V.M. Mr. Potter is best known for ferns. He is the states leading pteridephile and is well known for his fern walks and has lectured extensively. Because of his expertise many botonists are eagerly anticipating the completion of a book he is currently writing. We are sure it will be an unqualified success.

### III SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### A. Enrollment:

TT ENROTIMENT

There are 297 students enrolled in the Clarendon Elementary School for the present school year (1985-86). We anticipate that this number could increase slightly for 1986-87, as can be seen from the above tables. The number of Clarendon students attending Mill River is up again this year, but should decrease next year as our small sixth grade moves on.

#### B. Personnel:

Barbara Pratt, our former school librarian, has retired after serving the Clarendon Elementary School for fifteen years. Dorothy Lanfear, a long time cook in our school lunch program, has also retired. We express our appreciation to these people for their many years of service to the school system. There are a number of new faces around our school this year. Ardis Martin has been hired on a part-time basis to help with our large 5th grade. Pamela Jasmin and Janet Dube are new aides in our special education program. Michael Allen assumed responsibilities as our new superintendent of building and grounds during the spring of 1985. Diane Chartrand is now working full-time and is serving as our new library-media person.

#### C. Curriculum:

There are a number of exciting developments in our instructional program. Our new reading program, which emphasizes reading skill development at the primary level, has been extended to the third grade. Our new writing program continues to place emphasis on writing skills at all grade levels. A draft of a curriculum guide for this program has been completed by Mr. Tracy, working with a district committee of teachers. There is also a committee of teachers working on a formal health curriculum. Primary teachers have received training in the use of math manipulatives and are implementing these skills in the classroom. The new art program we implemented this past year has developed into an exciting and successful program.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (continued)

### D. Vermont Public School Approval Standards:

In 1984 the Vermont State Board of Education adopted new standards for the approval of public schools. At the present time the school staff is doing a self-assessment to determine how well we measure up to these new standards. This should be completed by June 1986. We have received word from the state that the school will undergo a complete evaluation during the 1986-87 school year.

### E. School Facilities:

We have recently completed a number of maintenance projects which were necessary because of the increasing age of the building and the equipment. These projects included: replacing the water pump; replacing the hot water heater; replacing baseboard molding; reworking the concrete steps at the gym entrance. Money to help finance some of these projects was taken from the building maintenance sinking fund.

### F. Budget Analysis:

The complete budget for the 1986-87 school year is included in the financial statements within this report. The proposed budget has elementary school expenditures of \$741,430.00. The major increases are as follows:

The above increases represent an 9.3% increase in elementary school expenditures. The increase under the instructional programs include additional staff for the reading program and next year's large 6th grade class.

### G. School Taxes:

The school tax picture over the past several years is illustrated in the table below:

In the above table the elementary school tax appears as a negative figure because all state aid, even that earned by Clarendon Mill River students, is paid directly to the town school district. Thus, it reduces the elementary budget and the elementary tax rate. The proposed budget estimates level funding of state aid. At this time we do not know what action the state legislature will take in funding state aid.



We held our first public hearing for our proposed town plan, adopted a new highway ordinance, and settled several aged lawsuits against the town. The past year saw the construction and opening of our transfer station. Other accomplishments included the writing of part 2 and 4 of our road maintenance plan, establishing paid holidays for our highway crew, and adopting the prevailing minimum wage for new highway employees. We also purchased a new grader after much heated debate.

Unfortunately there were disappointments, we proposed an "Industrial Development Search Committee or Corporation" yet there were no volunteers to serve as was the case for a Grant Committee that was proposed. We did receive an \$800.00 grant for our Road Maintenance Plan from the Transportation Information Exchange at Saint Michael's College.

Clarendon faces a challenging future in terms of both finance and growth. We must work together and boards must face problems squarely, if we are to secure and enhance our future.

On a personal note, the last three years have been rewarding and it has been a privilege to serve as one of your selectmen.

#### 1985 Town Clerks Report

In 1979 the projected cost of restoring Clarendon Land Records, volumes 1 thru 27 and General Index #1 was \$12,805.00. A budget of \$3,500.00 a year was provided for this purpose.

Restoration included new covers of red russian leather, pages were de-acidified and the pages were given a special lamanation process. In 1980 Land Records, volumes 1-6 (years 1770 to 1803) and General Index #1 were restored at a cost of \$2,994.00. In 1981 volumes 7-12 of Land Records (years 1802 to 1839), Birth and Death Records volume 1 (1857 to 1867), Birth, Death and Marriages volume #2 (1868-1896) at a cost of \$2,996.00. In 1984 Land Record volumes 13-17 were restored at a cost of \$3,284.00 and Land Records 18 and 19 were also done in 1984 at a cost of \$1,462.00. In 1985 new covers were provided for Volumes 29-32 at a cost of \$622.18. In 1985 Land Record volumes 39-53 (years 1974 to 1985) were microfilmed at a cost of \$525.00. Thus resulting in all Land Records to date on microfilm. Also in 1985 5 volumes of Town Reports were bound for years 1867 to 1970 at a cost of \$250.00. These are bound in green covers with gold trim. There are 8 volumes of Land Records remaining to be restored, these are volumes 20-27 which are much larger volumes than those previously restored and hand written. We anticipate to complete these restorations by 1987.

Total cost to date of the restoration project was \$12,133.18.

# TOWN OF CLARENDON 1985 Zoning Administrators Report

One hundred applications for zoning permits were received in 1985. There were sixteen permits issued for new houses, of these four replaced existing mobile homes. There were fifteen new mobile homes and also three additions, ten residential garages, eight additions to existing homes, five barns and several storage sheds.

Commercially, two residential garages were converted to commercial use, one addition to a commercial warehouse, one addition to a commercial garage and four warehouses. Three other buildings were converted to commercial use. An airplane hanger and buildings at Rutland Airport, three additional mobile home pads at two of the existing parks and a new gravel pit were issued permits. As you can see Clarendon continues to grow.

Linda Spencer is now Clarendon's zoning administrator and I hope that the townspeople will help her to perform her job. Many thanks to all that have helped me during my tenure as zoning administrator as I know I shall miss it. I believe Linda will serve the town well.

# VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

### Annual Report to the Citizens of Clarendon

The mission of the Vermont Department of Health is the prevention of illness and the control or elimination of hazards dangerous to the health of the public. In working toward this goal, the Health Department has provided, or assured the provision of health services to communities across the state. Direct services are provided through 11 district field offices. During fiscal year 1985, citizens of Clarendon received the following services from the district office in Rutland:

82 pregnant women, new mothers, and children received supplemental foods, health and nutrition services through the WIC program.

14 children and young adults received medical evaluation of individual health and dental status through the Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment program.

22 persons received assessment information and counselling through the Maternal and Child health program and/or information and teaching of parenting roles through prenatal classes and home visiting services.

17 children received comprehensive health assessments, including preventive guidance, at Well Child Clinics.

Diagnosis and treatment services for orthopedic, hearing, cardiac, genetic, developmental disorders, and other handicapping conditions were provided to 11 children through the Handicapped Children's program and/or the Child Development Clinic in Burlington.

The Public Health Laboratory in Burlington assists in the prevention and control of illness by identifying chemicals and microorganisms in a variety of substances. During fiscal year 1985, the following laboratory services were provided to residents of Clarendon:

33 blood tests to identify women needing immunization against German Measles (Rubella) to prevent birth defects,

32 other diagnostic blood tests,

147 tests of individual and municipal water systems to monitor drinking water quality,

The Dental Division provides services to local communities including installing and maintaining fluoridation equipment in selected community and school water systems, paying for dental treatment of eligible children, and providing dental health education in the schools.

Many services are provided at the local level by your Town Health Officer, R. Brownson Spencer II. Please feel free to call him if you need any assistance. The Health Department provides technical assistance and support to local health officers.

We encourage your participation in our programs. Information about all Health Department services may be obtained by calling our toll-free number 1-800-642-3323, or the Rutland district office at 773-5811.

This agency projects that it will spend \$21,452 to assist elders in your community during its current fiscal year.

,185 meals were delivered to the homes of 13 elders who were homebound and unable to come to the mealsite. This service is often called "Meals on Wheels".

#### Senior Advocate Assistance

41 persons over 60 received help through this program. Elders were assisted with applications and problem resolution in benefit programs such as Medicaid, Foodstamps, and SSI. Advocate staff helped a number of elders who had questions or problems related to health care payments and insurance claims. Among other things, Advocates helped elders file Vermont tax rebate claims and apply for energy program assistance.

This Agency provided support, directly or through contract, for the following additional services that were used by elders in your community:

- \* Long Term Care Ombudsman This individual provided advocacy assistance to residents of Community Care and Nursing Homes. The Ombudsman helped elders and, if appropriate, family members or friends sort out information regarding financial assistance and other concerns related to institutional care.
- \* Information and Referral This Agency maintained a directory of services and programs available to elders in our area. Elders were able to access this information by either calling or visiting our office.
- \* Legal Service Attorney for the Elderly The Area Agency provided funding for an Attorney whose role was to focus on the legal concerns of elders. This Attorney worked through the Vermont Legal Aid Office serving our region.
- \* Preventive Health Clinics Funding assistance was provided to the Rutland Area Visiting Nurses to conduct monthly health clinics at meal sites/senior centers. Health assessments, blood pressure checks and foot care were provided at the clinics. Elders were asked to make a minimal donation for this service.
- \* Essential Transportation On a limited basis, this agency re-imbursed mileage costs of volunteer drivers who transported elders needing this type of help to get to medical appointments or do essential food shopping.

# RETIRED SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM Annual Report 1985

Upon retirement many citizens lack opportunities, encouragement or motivation for meaningful use of their time. More than ever they need to know that they can still be recognized, accepted, needed and appreciated in their community.

Since 1973 the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) has been working with senior citizens (60+) throughout Rutland County in assisting them to volunteer their time, wisdom and skills with non-profit agencies in Rutland County so as to enrich their lives and provide supplemental staff and program expansion within limited agency budgets.

In 1984, 350 RSVP volunteers donated over 55,000 hours of service to more than 82 agencies in Rutland County. The 9 active Town of Clarendon RSVP volunteers donated their time at Clarendon Nutrition (SW Vt. AAA) - volunteers serve meals and clean up; Friendly visiting - visiting shut-ins; RSVP Special Projects - assist with Bazaar; sewing, knitting, and typing; Rutland Senior Chorus - entertain at local nursing homes; Vermont Educational TV - assist in telephone solicitation of local businesses, for a total of 709 hours. We encourage and invite any senior citizen to call us at 775-8220 if they would like to know more about our program. There is still a great need for volunteers.

Over the years the support that has been shown RSVP by the voters of the Town of Clarendon has been greatly appreciated. With it we have been able to provide volunteers with supplemental insurance, recognition benefits and transportation. With your help again this year RSVP volunteers look forward to another year of service to their community.

The UVM Extension Service is a combined effort of the University of Vermont and the US Department of Agriculture to bring practical educational programs to the people of Rutland County.
