AUDITORS' REPORT

To the voters of the Town of Clarendon:

In accordance with 3515 of the Public Laws, we have examined the accounts of the officers of the Town of Clarendon for the year ended December 31, 1947, and show herewith the balance sheet at that date together with a statement of income and expense for the year. In our opinion, based upon the examination we have made, the statements shown present fairly, on the basis indicated, the financial position of the Town and Town School District at December 31, 1947, and the results of its operation for the year ended, on that date, in accordance with generally accepted Accounting principles, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, in all respects except form. The difference here lies in a distinct division and separation of the Town School District and General Fund figures, rather than stating the two together as in prior years. The basis for our decision comes in the form of a recommendation from the State Auditor of Accounts and the application of the same principles by the State Auditor whose report of the preceding year has been studied by us. In considering the debt figure, the voters should therefore, understand this procedure. In other words, a net debt of \$6,299.11 was shown by last year's report at December 31, 1946; this year end, the net debt that would correspond may be found by deducting the Town School District surplus (\$2,783.84) from the General Fund deficit (\$7,152.37).

Cash on hand was confirmed by bank statement. Amounts due from the State but not confirmed by requests for warrants to the State Auditor of Accounts were omitted from the assets, as were inventories of real and other property to be in keeping with the conservative procedure of many years precedence in this Town.

All liabilities and accounts payable were confirmed by Town officers' order records or the creditors' statement or vote of the annual meeting and we satisfied ourselves that all such on December 31, 1947, had been brought into account, except for the

normal run of orders drawn since that time for goods and services delivered prior to the year end.

Receipts from all known sources are included and checked by examination of the various officers' accounts.

Disbursements have been checked with the cancelled checks and the orders they covered. For the most part, bills supporting orders were presented but not so completely as desired. Your attention is directed to the State Auditor's report of the Town Officers' records for the year ended December 31, 1946, for this subject.

Inventories of Town and Town School District property were not furnished by the various officers. Your attention is directed to page 112, of the Minutes of Town Officers' Educational Conference March 21-22, 1947, for this subject.

Independent statements of cemetery and other funds required by Public Laws of Vermont or precedence in this Town are herewith shown.

In the nature of comments and recommendations, we would merely wholeheartedly duplicate those presented by the State Auditor of Accounts in his report for the accounts of the officers of the Town of Clarendon for the year ended December 31, 1946, which report is contained later in the pages of this Town Report.

We appreciate very much the co-operation of all the officers in the preparation of this report.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of School Directors and Citizens
of the Town of Clarendon:

I have the honor of presenting herewith my first Annual Report as Superintendent of the Public Schools of the Town of Clarendon, having assumed the position here on July 1, 1947, following the retirement of that very good friend and superintendent, Frederick W. Wallace, who served this community so faithfully for twenty-three years.

TEACHERS

One of the greatest problems facing our schools, both in Clarendon and throughout the country, is the urgent demand for an increasing number of qualified teachers on the elementary level. Our citizens must recognize that trained teachers have been leaving the profession by the thousands during the last few years in order to better themselves in income and status. Today's shortage is not temporary. It takes years to train a teacher, and when a competent teacher leaves the profession, she simply cannot be replaced, as a rule, by one as good. Thus the children are the losers from this situation. In Vermont we have approximately 2,500 teachers and more than 600 of them have been granted emergency certification. Castleton, the largest college in our state for training elementary and junior high school teachers, has an enrollment of about 120 of which 55 are in the freshman class. The combined enrollments of the four teacher training institutions in the state totals roughly 370 students, out of which about 170 are in the freshman classes. The State of Vermont will graduate 18 four year students this year and 29 next year. When you consider a normal need of about 250 teachers each year, it is readily seen that the number of our graduates will be inadequate for years to come.

With respect to the quality of the Clarendon teachers, I sincerely feel that they are doing a competent piece of work. This opinion is a result of my personal observation of their classroom teaching during the last few months.

THE SCHOOLS

The Town of Clarendon is maintaining seven schools at the present time. Our schools provide instruction from grade one through eight. Basic subjects, such as reading, writing, arithmetic, social studies, and social behavior, form the main part of our curriculum. Added to this, of course, is correlated work in art, music, health, and physical education. It is planned, also, that a modern testing program will be installed in all grades.

I wish to call your attention to the tables which follow indicating the enrollment and percentage of attendance in our schools.

Please note particularly the crowded conditions in some of our schools, such as North Clarendon. With the recent high birth rate trends, these conditions are not going to improve within the next few years and most likely are going to get worse. Consequently, we have a problem here in town that is going to have to be faced.

Clarendon is virtually a suburb of the City of Rutland with plenty of room for growth; and good schools would be a major asset in attracting desirable citizens to our community. Therefore, I would suggest that the Town appoint a committee of interested citizens, representative of all parts of town, to work with the School Directors to make a study of our present and future school needs and to make recommendations at a future date.

THE BUDGET

School costs have been mounting over a period of years, but not as great as the advance in the cost of living, but represents, nevertheless, a substantial amount. Salaries of teachers have had to be raised due to the new State of Vermont minimum salary law, the cost of living, and also, due to the need of raising the profession to the standard which will attract young people to it. During the past few years, young people could not see the advantages of going into teaching, which requires the expenditure of several thousands of dollars besides the earning power for four years; when, at the culmination of this expenditure, a salary would be granted which, in many cases, would be less than that earned by a laborer who had made no such investment. Obviously, our youth choose other types of careers, at least as well paid, without the expenditure of time and money.

Books, supplies, maintenance costs, and all the various services have advanced rapidly, just as similar services have advanced in the operation of other businesses.

In order to give you a picture of the advance in prices of some common school materials, I quote you some figures from a leading supply house.

THE BUDGET

As you know, the last legislature made provision for increasing the tuition rate in our secondary schools. This means each town district shall pay tuition per pupil per school year as billed, but not in excess of \$100 unless authorized by a vote of the town school district, but in no case shall the tuition exceed the cost per pupil for the previous year.

The Rutland School Board has recently voted to raise tuition rates for our students attending their high school to \$150.00. If this new rate is approved by the voters of Clarendon, this will mean a considerable increase for our town, as we have between 25 and 30 pupils attending high school in Rutland.

STATE AND FEDERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS

The State Legislature, in its last session, passed several measures pertaining to education in the State of Vermont. State Aid has been increased considerable to help meet the new demand for funds, particularly a minimum salary scale for elementary teachers; whereby teachers, with a college training of one, two, three, or four years respectively, are to receive minimum salaries of \$1500, \$1600, \$1700, or \$1800. This is expected to result in more teachers becoming available in the future, but it will take a few years for this program to bear results.

The following figures show how the amount of State Aid for education to the towns of Vermont has increased over a period of a few years.

There is a commission at work in our state, appointed by the Governor, to draw up a new formula for the more equitable distribution of rebates to the towns for educational purposes.

Federal Aid to Education, without Federal control, has recently been endorsed by certain national, civic, and patriotic organizations, such as the National Grange, the American Legion Auxiliary, and others. A Financial-Aid-to-Education bill is definitely on the agenda of the present Congress. Also, it is possible that there may be, in a few years, Federal assistance to school replacements and school repairs which have been long neglected, due to the years of war and non-building.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATIONS

The various Parent-Teacher Groups and Parents Clubs have been functioning well during the year. These groups are an asset to our town, to the schools, and to the parents and children. With planned objectives, such as aiding the hot lunch program, these organizations have proved of real benefit to the community. Every parent of a child in school should be a member of the P.T.A. for the good of the children.

CONCLUSION

I wish at this time to express to you, the citizens of Clarendon, my appreciation for your splendid cooperation with the schools of our town. It is my desire, too, to thank the boys and girls for their fine spirit of helpfulness.

The task of education was once relatively easy when the economic order was a stable one. Today, with pressure from all directions and a rapidly changing economic order to prepare for, the difficulties are multiplied a hundred fold. Certainly, it must be emphasized over and over again that the home and general public must be sympathetic and actively helpful.

As I mentioned previously in this report, it is hoped that the town will see fit to appoint a committee to make a survey of the present and future school needs of this community and present their recommendations to the town at a future meeting.

The responsibility of teachers and school officials in educating for this modern world is to strengthen the program of education so youth will be well prepared for competent action in local, state, national, and world affairs. However, the educators cannot do the job alone. Parents and citizens have a huge investment in the schools and a tremendous responsibility. It is their duty to learn what good schools really are, to find out how well local schools meet the standard, and then, to give support to every movement which is likely to make them better.

WHO ARE VOTERS IN TOWN MEETING?

"Sec. 3422 P. L. *Qualifications of Voters.* A male or female citizen twenty-one years of age, who has taken the freeman's oath and whose list, including poll, is taken in a town at the annual assessment preceding a town meeting, and whose poll, old age assistance and flood taxes due such town, were paid prior to February 1 preceding such town meeting, or who has attained the age of twenty-one years subsequent to the last annual assessment and resided in the town since April 1 last preceding or who is exempt from taxation for any cause, shall, while residing in such town, be a voter in town meeting; but such male citizen, if a resident of an incorporated village within such town, shall not vote in town meeting for town road commissioner unless at least fifteen per cent of the last highway tax of such incorporated village has been paid to the town treasurer to be expended upon the highways of the town outside of such incorporated village. A person qualified to vote in town meeting under the provisions of this section shall be qualified to vote in all other municipal meetings.

In accordance with No. 55 of the Acts of 1937, herewith is submitted a report on an examination of the accounts of the **Town of Clarendon, Vermont** for the year ended December 31, 1946.

The following exhibits fairly present the financial condition of the Town on December 31, 1946 and the changes in cash for the year then ended:

Bank accounts were reconciled as at December 31, 1946 and were further verified by direct communication with the several depositories.

A contract between the Town of Clarendon and the City of Rutland providing the Town with fire protection was examined. The existence of a \$300.00 deposit, as provided in the contract, was verified at the Office of the Rutland City Treasurer.

Delinquent tax records of the Tax Collector were reviewed. Amounts due as at December 31, 1946, by years, are as follows:

Amounts due from the State of Vermont as at December 31, 1946 were established from the records in the Office of the Auditor of Accounts and the State Highway Department.

Only liabilities of substantial amount have been accrued as accounts payable. The detail follows:

Notes payable were confirmed by direct communication with the Killington National Bank.

According to the records maintained by the Department of Public Welfare, the Town of Clarendon is indebted to the State of Vermont, in the amount of \$869.96, for maintenance expenses of two children, Frances Paige and Marion Paige Hepburn. These children were committed to the care of the Department of Public Welfare by the Rutland Municipal Court on January 24, 1944, the State and the Town to share expenses equally. In Exhibit A this item appears as a contingent liability of the general town funds. A court suit is probable in the near future in settlement of this claim.

Receipts for the period were checked by an examination of current and delinquent tax collections, state aids, licenses and other miscellaneous items.

The audit of disbursements included a detailed checking of orders and canceled checks against the books of account. A substantial number of supporting vouchers were scrutinized. Vouchers supporting road work were not available. Sound

accounting requires that vouchers and other supporting papers be maintained by all officers.

The cemetery funds were reviewed and are summarized as follows:

The original papers creating these funds were not found. An attempt should be made to locate these records.

General Comments

Section 3484 of the Vermont Public Laws states that the selectmen shall give a certified tax warrant to the treasurer. This section should be strictly followed, as this gives the treasurer a definite record of taxes to be accounted for.

When taxes become delinquent the treasurer is paid a five cent warrant fee for each sum. Section 9111, Form 37, of the Public Laws sets forth the form of this warrant.

Exhibit B reveals a transfer of funds amounting to \$4,671.99, from the general town fund to the school fund in order to liquidate the school deficit to December 31, 1946 and provide the school fund with cash to the end of its fiscal year. The Town maintains a single checking account for both the general town fund and the school fund. On December 31, 1946, as shown in Exhibit B, the general town fund had a cash overdraft of \$1,014.41 and the school fund a debit balance of \$2,462.66, combined, a net debit balance of \$1,448.25.

A distinct separation of funds in the annual town report should be made in order to present as separate entities the general town fund and the school fund.

Attention is called to Section 3486 of the Vermont Public Laws which stipulates that "When a town or a town school district at the end of its fiscal year has a deficit, the selectmen when making up the next annual tax bill shall add thereto a tax of five per cent or such multiple of five in addition to the tax vote

already authorized by law, to be levied upon the grand list of such town, as will provide sufficient revenue to liquidate such deficit. A deficit is the excess of expenditures incurred during the fiscal year just ended for ordinary expenses over the cash received from taxes paid and other revenue."

The town school district should vote a tax sufficient to meet its anticipated expenditures and not expect the general town fund to meet part of these charges.

The body of a man named Frank Burns was sold by the Overseer of the Poor for \$100.00 to the University of Vermont and State Agricultural College on December 9, 1946. Their check dated December 14, 1946 was made payable to the Overseer of the Poor and was so endorsed. The check also bears the endorsement of a Theresa Z. Mullin. This check should have cleared through the town treasury.

It is recommended that:

1. All cash remittances clear through the town treasurer for which should be issued receipts on a triplicate pre-numbered form, the disposition of the original and copies to be as follows:

Original—to remitter

1st copy—to town officer or town officers whose fund is affected

2nd copy—to be retained by treasurer

2. Settlements between the tax collector and treasurer on account of delinquent taxes be in detail and in duplicate. Both parties should sign the form, the original going to the tax collector and the copy being retained by the treasurer.

3. Orders be used for all payments, including the county tax and electric light bills.

4. All town orders before pre-numbered.

5. Formal withholding tax records be maintained by the several town officers, both by individual employees and in total.

The town officers contacted by the auditors were very courteous and co-operative. This is greatly appreciated.

9. Shall licenses for the sale of malt and vinous beverages be granted in this Town.
10. Shall spirituous liquors be sold in this Town?
The vote under articles 9 and 10 shall be by ballot in form as provided by this act. Such ballots are furnished by the Secretary of State.
11. Shall the Town employ a State Auditor to audit the books. *no*
12. Shall the names of all delinquent tax payers be printed in the Town Report. *no*
13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to buy a power road grader, not to exceed \$15,000.00 *no*
14. Shall the Town authorize the School Directors to pay in excess of \$100 tuition fees when necessary? *no*
15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
